2264-2292	Reapportionment. Committee for Government of the People (1964-68). The Committee was established under the chairmanship of Dirksen to obtain support for the reapportionment amendment. As the only authorized fund-raising organization in the nation for the effort, the Committee organized regional groups to coordinate efforts to pass the amendment and to establish a Constitutional Convention. The Committee's work was managed by a California public relations firm headed by Clem Whitaker. This file contains correspondence, contributors lists, press releases, memoranda, and reports from the Committee on the following topics: origin, organization, and purpose of the Committee; fund-raising activities and solicitation strategy; legislative strategy for the reapportionment amendments; and, a proposal to establish a National Citizens Committee for Constitutional Government.
